If you work in America and receive a paycheck, you have been influenced by Dan Maddux. As the Executive Director of the nation's leader in payroll education and training, he has played a key role in developing the training and resources that America's payroll professionals use to pay workers accurately and on time, resulting in saving participants' companies from paying costly noncompliance fines.

He arrived in New York City at age 19 to attend the American Academy of Dramatic Arts. His career began as the first employee hired by a fledgling association. Over the next ten years, he would hold every job in the association, ultimately becoming Executive Director.

Today that fledgling association has a publishing division in New York, nationally-acclaimed payroll training centers in Las Vegas and San Antonio, as well as a government relations office in Washington, D.C. Under his leadership the association has grown to more than 23,000 members, 153 local chapters, and a staff of nearly 100. More than 20,000 payroll professionals receive training each year through his association's hundreds of in-class and online educational offerings. In 1996, he founded National Payroll Week as an industry-wide public awareness campaign to help educate workers on issues relating to their paychecks and the payroll withholding system. Maddux has a vast travel schedule in the US, and he regularly addresses audiences in Canada, United Kingdom, Australia and South Africa.

The United States Department of the Treasury awarded him its prestigious Medal of Merit for his work on behalf of U.S. Savings Bonds in 2002 and a Public Service Award from the Social Security Administration in 2000. The National Speakers Association honored him in 2001 as the Meeting Partner of the Year. Maddux is frequently quoted in the news media on management and marketing issues and appears regularly on national television.

Maddux divides his time among his residences in Las Vegas and San Antonio. He owns Comfort Cloisters, a historic church converted into a special events and wedding chapel, located in the Texas Hill Country.
